Fairtrade – and the Sustainable Development Goals

Part 1 – Protecting the Environment



Fairtrade promotes environmentally friendly practices, such as improving soil and water quality, prohibiting harmful chemicals and encouraging biodiversity. Fairtrade co-operatives provide training for farmers, and can support them to adapt to climate change and convert to organic production. In fact, over 50% of all Fairtrade certified producers are also certified organic.

Many co-operatives invest the Fairtrade Premium in environmental sustainability, such as providing more resilient crops to farmers struggling to cope with outbreaks of pests and diseases, or planting new trees to protect soils and indigenous wildlife.



These actions contribute to Sustainable Development Goals 12 & 13.

Finding our Way through Jesus' Life

Jesus <u>Christ</u> was born in a stable at the small town of Bethlehem. As there are no beds or cots in a stable, his mother Mary laid him in the animals' feeding trough—called a manger. We celebrate Jesus' birth every year at <u>Christ</u>mas.

Jesus went to school, probably in the Jewish place of worship—called a synagogue. And when he left school, Joseph taught him his own skill, that is: to be a carpenter.

However, Jesus was the Son of God, sent from heaven to do other things. So, when he was about 30 years old, he left home to become a preacher and a healer. He preached about how God loves everyone, and he practised that love through his healing. Among the many who were healed was a 12-year old girl whom he found laying on her sick bed.

You will not be surprised to find that Jesus became very popular with ordinary people. But those in power thought he was a threat to their way of life. So they pretended he had broken Jewish law, and had him crucified—that is: he was killed on a cross. We think about this terrible deed every year on Good Friday. This year Good Friday will be on 25th March.

Jesus' body was put into a grave called a tomb, which is like a cave with a large rock in front of it. But God did not like that, and—after a couple of days—he raised Jesus back to life. Can you see (in the drawing below) that the rock has been moved away. That was on a Sunday—we call it Easter Day or Easter Sunday. This year we will celebrate Easter Sunday on 27th March.

Over the following six weeks, Jesus visited many of his friends to show that he was alive and to encourage them to carry on his work after he had left them. Those friends were called <u>Christians</u>, and Jesus' friends are still called <u>Christians</u> today. So Jesus ascended through a cloud into heaven on a day we call Ascension Day, which this year we will remember on Thursday 5th May.
