View from the Manse...

This summer we have just had the hottest temperatures in the UK ever, having reached 40° C (104°F!!!) I don't know what you did –



we tried to stay inside and in the shade that day. Unfortunately, we are told that this will be a more common occurrence in the coming years. I enjoy warm sunny weather, but that heat is just too hot for comfort. And it is obvious that our climate has been heating up for many years. As a child we had many feet of snow in Toronto – now there is barely a small snowfall all winter.

Climate change is a reality, and we need to take it seriously and do what we can to reduce our carbon footprint and reduce the use of fossil fuels as soon as we can. I am glad that we as a church continue to be involved in Eco Action and the subgroup Eco Faiths Group seeking ways of making our town more ecologically friendly. We still seek to reuse, recycle and repair things in the church and are pleased that the Eastern synod has agreed to give us a grant toward changing all the lightbulbs in the church to LED. This means they will use less energy, and not need to be changed so often.

Yet, I acknowledge that although I try to use my bike instead of drive to church, I do sometimes use the car. I do have a hybrid car, so hopefully use less petrol, but still need some. And we are travelling to Canada on an airplane this summer, which I know has a high carbon footprint.

The reality is that we do have some trade-offs as we try to be ecofriendly. One thing we can do is try to off-set it planting a tree, which we hope to do.

Nevertheless, we should not give up on our efforts, not only ourselves to do our best, but also to lobby our government to make sure they do what is possible to become net zero as soon as possible.

God loves this world and does care what we do with it. We know that God cares how we look after the natural environment including insects and animals, birds and fish.

We are a UK charity based in Ipswich, Suffolk, with centres across the country.

We have a mission to empower people in Africa living in extreme poverty to create their own livelihoods

We do this by sending trade kits full of tools that are used in skills training centres, offering the trainees a way to put poverty in the past for good and begin their own sustainable careers.


We send around 18 containers to rural African communities every year, full of tools that have been collected from across the UK, and refurbished in our refurbishment centres.

We have a strong environmental focus, as our work helps to keep around 225 tonnes of tools out of landfills in the UK every year.

AN ECONOMIC SEE-SAW Serendipity daydreams On a lazy sunny day, Makes worries mounting on our heads Seem many miles away.


Purse strings straining tighter As costs climb through the roof, Sleepless nights of stressing, Brown envelopes the proof.

This group is a collection of special individuals who make all their own goods. It's made up of a many and varied artists and crafters which tends to make every event on the first Saturday of the month quite different.

The name originates from those who met first at a fair many years ago. Now thirteen years later from the first event we're still going strong. The Saints name was chosen as most stallholders came from St Ives, St Neots and various areas between the two.

We've seen many changes over the years as our guest stallholders come and go and keeps the variety for each event. Some example guests included woodworker, ceramicists, and all kind of artists and we are always looking for new and varied crafters.





We began with a test fair at the St Ives Parish Church hall as at the time there was nowhere else available. But, this didn't stop the first six or seven of the group working hard to put the word out that we were here to stay. Following on, in April 2009, we found a happy, permanent home in the centre of St Ives at the Free Church Hall.


