
As few of us will be going abroad for a holiday which travel book has given you the most pleasure?. My choice is.......

Davaar Island Paintings

walk and then found when I got to the island that there were some cave paintings. I was expecting something quite different but was amazed to find am image of Christ. In 1887 ARCHIBALD MACKINNON, A local Campbeltown art teacher, had a vision in which he was instructed to paint a depiction of the crucifixion in a cave on Davaar Island. Fisherman thought the artwork was a miracle from God and initially when the artist came to light, he was driven out of town but was eventually allowed back. He twice restored his original work and it is now a local artist looking after it. A challenging place to get to, and if you look up on a map you will see Cambeltown is about as inaccessible as it gets on the UK mainland before the challenges of a causeway but well worth a visit if you are feeling fit! I was not sorry to find John coming to meet me on the causeway with car handy to reload bike onto!

Huntingdon's First Eco Fair on 17th July 2021 by Sally Runham

This event was held in Market Square with the main market along the high street, allowing

shoppers to flow from one to the other. Stallholders demonstrated key messages: minimise waste, recycle more efficiently and use less single-use plastics: all aiming to be more sustainable. Hard soap can replace bottled liquid soaps, shower gels and shampoos. Vegan meals and recipes were promoted as tasty alternatives to meat. HDC demonstrated management of waste. Huntingdon Rotary demonstrated their Young Environmentalist awards. Some stalls had upcycled crafts on display, such as pen and plant pots. Cards made from recycled materials included thin metal motifs for specific events. One stall had a quiz to let visitors estimate how long it would take



various items to decompose. Sucka Straws plastic free straws can be washed and recycled: shown right! Let's hope such events get bigger with lots of sustainable ideas.


Earliest holiday memories....from Chris.

'And, of course, they'd have a boat,'


'He went out in the boat, secretly, with the treasure—'
