

A local Toilet Twinning partner in Kabale district taught Justine the skills she needed to build a simple loo for her family. They also taught her the importance of hygiene and hand washing. It has, guite literally, changed her life. The family's health has improved dramatically. Before they had a loo, the family suffered from intestinal worms and diarrhoea. Justine is now part of the local Community Development Team, who help others build their own latrines. So she can give the same life-changing gift to others. Children are healthier, and able to go to school; parents are well enough to work their land and grow enough food to feed their family. With better health, and more ability to earn a living, men and women discover the potential that lies within them to bring transformation.

So family by family, community by community, nation by nation, you are helping to flush away poverty.

Does nothing ever change.....?

A few nights before Christmas and I watch a report on the BBC News about people being turned out onto the streets by ruthless landlords who have not put proper rent agreements in place to protect their tenants and whose properties are not always safe or appropriate. Many of these people are innocent about the laws that should apply to tenancy and many are immigrants, often working in our care sector.



The other day I was turning out a box from the loft and found the paperwork relating to an "international" work camp I attended in 1968 during a summer vacation from university. The UN was to supply volunteers to work on a housing project in Notting Hill, a deprived area in those days in the Borough of Kensington and Chelsea, and made famous in those days by the notorious landlord, Peter Rachman. We were to sleep on the floor of a convent just off the Portobello Road and were to help with a housing project, collecting vital information about multioccupancy, illegally subdivided properties and the type of heating, cooking and toilet facilities (or not!) that each family had access to. This information was to be used to try to improve legislation relating to unscrupulous landlords!

As very few people in the volunteer group spoke English many of them had a lovely free holiday in London: a few of us conducted all the interviews with tenants - quite an eye-opener for someone like me from a relatively affluent north London suburb! I also drew the short straw for ensuring everyone was fed on a shoestring budget - logic being that I admitted that my mother could cook! I remember making several phone calls to mum for ideas, all of course from a red phone kiosk, feeding in the pennies and trying to write down recipes at the same time!!!! I also became adept at bargaining for fruit and veg on the Portobello Rd Market!

How times have changed: the former squalid "homes", because that is what they were, are now the multimillion pound homes of well-to-do Londoners. BUT – have things changed? Not really, different vulnerable people, in a different area of London, being exploited by different but equally ruthless landlords who think nothing of turning families onto the street at Christmas! Sometimes I wonder if there are any answers - but at least I feel I did try to do something - and sometimes that is all we can do.....try, try and try again!

The Chamber Orchestra of St Ives (COSI)

is delighted to welcome local musician, Alex Fryer, to perform an oboe concerto on Saturday January 9th, 2016.



A former Hinchingbrooke school pupil from Ramsey Heights, Alex started learning the flute aged 9 then picked up the oboe when he was 14. After graduating with a first class honours degree in music from the University of Southampton, specialising in oboe performance, conducting and singing, he accepted a place to study a Masters in Performance at the Royal College of Music in London where he is now in his second year.

Alex has previously played with COSI and also in the band for St Ives Youth Theatre. More recently he has played principle oboe with the Royal College of Music Symphony Orchestra and in multiple other projects including various contemporary music projects and chamber music recitals.

A theme of 'dance' was chosen to encourage a lively start to the New Year and the concert opens with Respighi's Ancient Airs and Dances, suite no 2, which is based on lute dances composed in the early 1600s. This is followed by the Martinu oboe concerto, the rhythmical vitality of the last movement being reminiscent of a vivacious Czech Polka. The evening closes with Beethoven's symphony no 7 named the 'Apotheosis' of the dance by Wagner and the second movement well known as a backdrop to the film 'The King's Speech'.

The concert kicks off at 6pm on Saturday 9th January in the Free Church, St Ives. Tickets £8 adults and £5 children, available on the door or from Just Sharing in the Free Church. Email felicitycello@gmail.com with enquiries.
