
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Dear friends in Christ Jesus,

As we enjoy these lovely days in the beautiful world of God's creating, it is sad to reflect on all the evil things happening all around us. France has suffered so much from terrorist

activity, as has Belgium, Turkey and the Middle East. Now we are hearing of racial division and tension in the USA. Potential dangers of flying are emphasised by the chaos and delays at airports, and the destruction – or even disappearance - of aircraft. So much of what is happening can be summed up in the words of H.E.Fosdike's hymn,

'Lo, the hosts of evil round us scorn the Christ, assail His ways!
From the fears that long have bound us, free our hearts to faith and praise.
Grant us wisdom, grant us courage, for the living of these days.'

Leading worship and preaching in so many churches around St. Ives and further afield in the Fens, I was often asked, prior to the Referendum, what were my views, and what did the Bible say on this issue? The only answer I could give was — whatever the result, God remains our eternal refuge and underneath are his everlasting arms. I might be sad.'


The Bible offers great encouragement for the living of these challenging days. Consider the passage from Romans ch.8 vs 35-39.


Down Memory Lane

In her book 'Not An Easy Church', Mary Carter writes about the Rededication Service to celebrate the reopening of our refurbished church building in 1980.

Mary writes: "On Saturday 27th September, the building was re-opened under its new name The Free Church Centre. After eighteen months of planning and hard work, the vision was transformed into reality. The congregation began to arrive an hour before the time of the service and were entertained by the Church's Folk Group."

So - who was this folk group? Well here they are photographed They 1982. were called 'Chapter 2' and all were members of the Free Church. Many of you will recognise on the left Stewart Denham and Valerie Fleming who are still church members today. Some of you will recognise Joan Simpson in the centre who has since moved from St Ives and now lives near Catworth, and on the right Jackie Barrington-Light. Dennis Dennis was church treasurer during the 1980 refurbishment and his wife Jackie was the first office secretary when the new building opened.





Although Mary Carter refers to Chapter 2 as the church's folk group, they performed only occasionally in church worship. The group sang and played together for about 5 years performing mostly in village halls and churches in the local area. On a number of occasions they performed with Jancis Harvey, a Cambridge folk singer well known on local radio and TV. Chapter 2 gave their final concert performance in The Free Church in March 1983.

both at home and abroad. Some of the story of Jeju Island was hard to hear as they have been persecuted at various times. However, they are now attempting to be an island of peace and in the forefront of trying to unite North and South Korea. The hospitality offered was at times overwhelming and this was an experience that will live long in the memory. I have also learnt things that hopefully I will be able to put to good use in my ongoing ministry. 

The Power of a Kind Word

I have been reflecting on my mum's death and in people particular how reacted to it and the support that many friends and family were able to give in a very difficult time. Although Mum had not been in a good way for many years, she was still my Mum and someone I had always been extremely close to.



I was surprised at the number of sympathy cards and letters John and I received. I recalled the times I have thought in the past should I send one, the recipient's will have loads and won't even notice if I send one. I know now, that each and every one is important and read. I sent a letter to all on Mum's Christmas card list and let people know of her death and funeral arrangements. We received some lovely letters back from old friends and relatives of hers I barely knew. I sent the order of service and my eulogy to one or two too frail to travel. In particular a cousin of mum's from Blanaevon sent a second lovely letter back on receipt. Despite being in his mid 80's and suffering many ailments himself, he recalled holiday visits to Mum's parents and Mum when he was a young boy; previously I had only heard Mum's version. It was lovely. We gave out Mum's autobiography at the wake and I was touched by the emails and letters I received from some, including my old Pathfinder leader from my childhood church, saying how he could here Mum's voice coming through the words and that despite Microsoft's best efforts to clean up local dialect!

I emailed my five flatmates from university, who all knew Mum well from her visits there, and with whom I am still very much in touch and see regularly. It was interesting to see what came back. I got some lovely emails recalling especially the food Mum used to bring to university for us all to share; and her sense of fun and wanting to join in whatever we were doing. One friend remembered a reunion with Mum and me when Mum was in her 70's. She wanted to carry on playing

French cricket with the children when most (younger) adults had had enough. I also noted the friend who knew Mum best, and who runs her own business sent, a polite but perfunctory reply from her work email. It felt like someone just getting another email out of her busy in tray and that is a lesson for

Time matters when a me to remember. friend is in need of support. I was very touched by my best friend from school days. She rang up when she heard the news and, even though I was in floods of tears, talking to her on the phone for 30 minutes, she was there for me. She also came down from Yorkshire with her 85 year old mother for the funeral in Hereford even though they had both committed to come down to another much sadder funeral in Herefordshire later the same week for a significantly younger person. Finally this same friend wrote a moving letter afterwards in a card with a chicken on it (which was a theme at the funeral) saying my Mum would have loved it and saying there were things she wanted to say that she did not have the opportunity to do so at the funeral. She recalled her memories of staying on the farm as a child and it was so obvious, and I had not appreciated, that my Mum had meant as much to her as a teenager as her late father had to me. It was emotional and wonderful to read.

I also appreciated the texts and emails, while I was with Mum as she died and in the immediate aftermath. It felt a very lonely time, and to know friends were thinking and praying for us meant a lot, thank you.

So what have I learnt? Sympathy cards matter. It is worth taking the time to write something for the bereaved to read. I was taught, by my Mum, who else, to always say something positive about the person who had died and share a memory. It is hard when you may not know the person but a word of support or card or text or email or comment on social media, however hard to do, is still much appreciated. I hope, pray and trust that I will find myself able to give others as much or more support than I received when they are going through difficult times.

Ann was ordained and took up her first ministry in the Birmingham area but sadly died suddenly within two to three years of being ordained. Her home church was Hampton Dene URC in Hereford and I went there a few times while in Hereford during Mum's final few months when she was in hospital and care homes. The church has a modern style and was built in 1963 as a multi-purpose building. They refurbished a stain glass window back to its original blue colour and dedicated it to Ann's memory and I thought I would share a couple of pictures.

However we voted in the EU referendum, and whatever we feel about the result, at least we had the right to vote. Nature has no vote. Yet the result leaves UK nature under great threat.

But Christians acting together have a key role in defending it.

OFFER MORE

Many of our key environmental protections in the UK – on birds, habitats, as well as air pollution and water quality – originated as EU legislation. Even before the referendum, some senior politicians were seeking to water this down. The danger now is that, in departing the EU, we lose these protections.

So, what can we nature-loving Christians do?

We must pray for the protection of nature. We must use our democratic rights to help answer that prayer, urging legislation and action in favour of nature.

But we can offer much more. The referendum exposed deep divisions in UK society. Many have indicated that they voted to leave the EU as a protest vote – against perceived loss of identity, control, and being left behind in the economic race. In some extreme quarters this has expressed itself in racism.

BUILD UNITY

Yet we know that access to a healthy environment and abundant nature is important for people's well-being. Working alongside others on a practical project – from developing a community nature reserve to conducting a church energy audit – strengthens relationships and builds unity.

With churches present in all communities up and down the land, containing people who voted both Remain and Leave, we can demonstrate love and unity by caring for God's creation, with a positive impact for all – whatever their economic status, ethnicity, or faith. We can bring hope.
