A TRIBUTE TO KEITH CLARKE

Keith Douglas Clarke was born on 13th November 1940 in Ipswich, the first son of Henry and Evelyn Clarke. He remained an only child for nearly 6 years until his brother Michael was born.

He grew up in a loving family environment and was educated at St John's primary school and then Copleston Secondary Modern in Ipswich. Growing up, he was an active member of the 17th Ipswich Scout group as a Cub, a Scout and then a Rover. He enjoyed badminton and competed in the local league.

The family had many family holidays. Mike remembered a holiday in Windermere in the early 1950's. The family travelled all the way from Ipswich on a pre-war motorbike and side care. The two boys and mum were packed into a sidecar

along with the tent, equipment, and food for the week. They had a great time camping albeit in the rain.

Another place they visited was the New Forest where they could watch the Queen Elizabeth and Queen Mary coming up the Solent into dock and dream of sailing on them. Later in his life he did enjoy time on cruises.

The Norfolk Broads also played a large part in his life for many years. In 1957 he left Copleston and was accepted as a junior by Ipswich and East Suffolk Council and worked his way


through the ranks of local government planning.

He married in 1962 and moved to Caversham near Reading. His first son John was born while they lived in Berkshire. He then returned to Suffolk County Council and moved back to Ipswich where Andrew and Christopher were born. Keith then moved to Basildon and then Horsham in Surrey.

In April 1974, he remarried and then moved with his wife Gill to St Ives. They adopted Nick. They enjoyed their boat Joybell on the Broads and then brought it closer to home, mooring at Needingworth. It is rumoured that he would take it to Godmanchester some mornings and after work would cruise back to St Ives with work colleagues and a few drinks en route.

The boat was then substituted for a caravan and he and Gill spent much of their

early retirement caravanning all over the country. After Gill's passing he continued caravanning and met Ruth a like-minded tourer (so like-minded they had the same type of van and towed with the same type of car). They married in the St lves Free Church in November 2009. They then set about touring the world and would report back to the family about their great adventures.

He was one of a kind, and he was indeed a kind and gentle man. He lived his life to the full and we know that we will all miss him.

For me it was a great privilege to conduct Keith's funeral services and particularly the Service of Thanksgiving at the Free Church. It caused me to reflect on why people are elected to be Church Secretary. I believe there are a few reasons for this. One is that they already have a record of service to God and to God's



Church. Keith had been a leader of Fury at the Free Church and this was combined with Fury at a national level and particularly with *Anchors' Away*. Keith's long experience going back to childhood of the Norfolk Broads made him a natural for this type of leadership. He was good at combining service at a local level and the vision of the larger Church life.

It is also very important that Church Secretaries are good with people. This was certainly true with Keith. He noticed what was happening around him and certainly what was happening to people. In short, he

cared about them and somehow they knew that to be true. He cared about individuals and also about how they

related to one another, to the harmony of the Church, of people together.

Keith's dedication and drive were significant and showed us that he was keen on being busy in serving us. He was like many of us and we could relate to him. He loved us.

I will continue to look back on my time at The Free Church and to working with Keith as a great blessing. I remember his care of Gilly. Again I use the word privilege of being there to conduct Gilly funeral and to be able to give thanks for



her great determination in the face of much suffering. For all of us who were close to Keith at that time we were so glad when Ruth came into his life, the joy of their marriage and of their seven good years together.

There is much more that could be written about his service to the Church and the town including his leadership in the Town Centre Initiatives and his organisation of summer concerts. In the end it is enough to say that say that he was a good man, a faithful Christian and we all benefitted greatly because we knew him.
