
We can do our part by praying for those affected and by giving financial assistance where we are able, but most of all, by building God's blessings, a sense of community where all are valued and respected in society.

From the Church Secretary.....

In July we begin to get feedback from some of the church events. The **Exhibition Day** in the church on 24th June allowed many of the organisations that use our church for meetings to meet each other and chat. Our buildings are used by a wide variety of groups. Present were groups such as the Gardening Club, Saints Crafters, U3A Italia, the Photography Club and the RSPB.

Then there were the sports groups such as Bowls Club and Sunny Steps. Society and history were well represented by the Civic Society and U3A

Local History. There were groups addressing current issues such as the Credit Union, Eco Group and Women's Institute. Also there, were charities and groups with special pastoral concerns such as the Volunteer Bureau and the Alzheimer's Group. Also our church groups were well represented with exhibits from the worshipping church, from Chapel Prayers and the Poetry Group to Tots and Carers. Tookey's was also represented. There were lots of handouts and free helpful advice.

Each group was enthusiastic and celebrated being local, but are also being careful to ensure that they could balance their finances with sufficient members. However, people were expressing interests in the different groups on the day, and there were many interesting conversations across groups. There was a sense of inclusion and also awareness of those who could not attend for the day, but who do valuable work in St Ives. Our thanks to Babs Moore for coming up with the idea for the day with the help of her planning team – Irene McCormick, Joey Dyke and Sandy Nunn.

The Big Day Out for the Eastern Synod was a joyful occasion with carefully planned worship and activities for all ages. In dazzling sunlight, I stood by my posters on the subject of 'mental health and wellbeing'. In response to my question about the topics that people would most like to see articles written on health and wellbeing, the top responses included: loneliness; dropping in to visit; how to be a good visitor and companion; and understanding the phases of dementia. Also included were young peoples' mental health, anxiety and eating disorders. Other areas were preventing alcoholism and substance misuse.

The analyses of our **Church Questionnaire** is still underway and we handed out more questionnaires at the Exhibition in June. We hope that this survey will report soon.

The Save Our Spire Appeal continues at pace with work about to begin on the Spire. On Sunday, 9th July from 3.00pm to 7.00pm we are all invited to the Garden Party in Oakington (see Page 8). Tickets are now on sale from Just Sharing. Special thanks go Sonia Spurling and Charlotte Jordan (see Page 9) for their work on procuring some excellent raffle prizes from local businesses for the Save our Spire fund-raising appeal (see Page 11). Please do consider buying tickets for the Garden Party, with the contributions also going to help fund the repairs to the Spire.

This month the **Elders Meeting** is on 5th July; and the **Church Meeting** is at 12.15pm on Sunday 16th July where we will consider the use of the building for the registration of same-sex marriage. The church is responding to changes in English law and according to a resolution from the 2016 General Assembly. The discussion will be facilitated by Rev John Filsak.



Tapestry and Synergy Concert on 10th June

The SOS team was speechless with wonder at the support of the teamed choirs, Tapestry and Synergy, and the fantastic audience participation in the whole event that gave rise to £1,400 for the 'Spire Appeal.' The evening of sheer delight, emotion and fun was the culmination of detailed planning and preparation by Irene.

Tapestry (pictured below) is a mixed-voice, a-cappella chamber choir of 14 singers based in Cambridgeshire. Formed in 1996, its repertoire has grown considerably every year, offering period and contemporary sacred music, via a wide variety of genres, to more up-beat popular songs – almost always unaccompanied. Tapestry is well known



locally and events often sold out.

Neither a male voice choir nor a barbershop chorus, **Synergy** (pictured below) aims to blend the best of both genres into beautiful a-cappella, four–part close harmony. Formed in 2006 and based in Abergavenny, South Wales, Synergy offers a varied repertoire from the Beatles to Queen, American Classics to Showstoppers, touching ballads to laughout-loud barnstormers, all held together with light



humour.

As the Feast of Pentecost dawned, we learnt of another appalling terrorist attack in London, the third attack within weeks. It is therefore important that we say clearly alongside our fellow faith leaders that such horrific acts are abhorrent to God and to all people of faith. Life is precious, the gift of God, and it is to be prized.

Our thought and prayers will continue to be with those who have been bereaved and those who are recovering from injuries suffered in those attacks.

Churches Together across the land have been praying in these past weeks for the coming of God's kingdom. In the face of increased terrorist activity those prayers are particularly poignant. The kingdom of God is love, justice and joy, and the gifts of the Spirit given for building it. Even in such acts of darkness, we have caught glimpses of the kingdom in the kindness of strangers to each other, the extraordinary bravery of the emergency services and the dedication and skill of medical teams. We thank God for them.

Part of our vocation as Christians is to stand together with our friends and neighbours of all faiths and none to seek the flourishing of all, and refuse to let violence and hatred deflect us from living compassionately and kindly together. Another part of our vocation is to share in Christ's ministry of forgiveness and reconciliation, to pray for those who hate that they may grow close to the God of mercy and love and be transformed.

In this season of Pentecost we invite all who are part of Churches Together to pray for the gifts of the Spirit so that they may be activists for the love of God, building healing, reconciling and forgiving communities where God's kingdom can grow and all be valued as children of God.
