### From the Church Secretary

April brings a shower of thoughts for things to do in spring. Here are three activities that are on our horizon for our church in the coming few months.

At the March meeting of the East of England Synod, we considered the United Reformed Church theme of Holy Habits. This comes under the banner of 'Walking the Way: Living the life of Jesus today' the new focus of the URC of missional discipleship. Booklets have been published on ten holy habits from the book by Andrew Roberts. They can be used as study guides for groups and congregations. They are excellent practical resources for use locally. These include:



Biblical teaching
Fellowship
Breaking bread
Prayer
Sharing resources
Serving
Eating together
Gladness and generosity
Worship
Making more disciples.

We have copies which Catherine is planning to use in the church over the coming year.

Secondly, the General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) come into effect in May 2018 and the church has a privacy notice. This will be available from the church office, and discusses how we handle any personal information of people connected with the church, in line with GDPR standards. It contains information about which data is gathered, how the data is stored, why the organisation needs the data, what we will do with it and how long we will keep it. We only hold information where there is a legitimate need for its use. In this we promise never to pass your details on to another organisation without your consent. We will store your personal data securely and use this information to deliver what you have asked us to do in the church and to communicate with you in the ways you have chosen. Consent for holding personal information can be withdrawn at any time by writing to churchsecretary@stivesfreechurch.org.

At Synod we learned about the launch of Stepwise. This is a new intergenerational United Reformed Church discipleship programme. It is for people of all ages and backgrounds. The launch will be in September 2018. Stepwise is open to anyone who is keen to reflect on and develop their Christian faith. ### THE MANOR HOUSE

### - a new history and guide

What an unexpected but very pleasant surprise this month to discover a newly published book about The Manor House, Hemingford Grey, part of which is written by a dear friend and former member of our Free Church — the late Dr Mary Carter. The book is a collaborative project by Mary Carter and Diana Boston, the owner and resident of The Manor House.



In the foreword to the book, Diana Boston writes:

'Dr Mary Carter lived locally and taught at St Peter's School, Huntingdon. She was an active church member and was asked to write a history of the St Ives United Reformed Church (The Free Church). While doing this she discovered a passion for local history and went on to write and edit several books including 'Hemingford Grey is Famous for its Enormous Gooseberries', which is a history of Hemingford Grey through its street names. While carrying out the research for this book, alongside Stewart Denham and Bob Burn-Murdoch, she became fascinated by the history of The Manor. I handed to Mary the folder of cuttings and historical information that Lucy Boston had gathered over the years and she started her work on this history.

As with everything to which Mary set her hand, her research into this history was extremely thorough. She completed writing it in 1997 but, alas, died in 2012 before I got round to writing my guide to The Manor. I am delighted at last, to be able to complete my guide so that the two can now be published together, helped by an award from the Goodliffe Trust.'

In the book, The Manor House is described as one of the oldest inhabited houses in Britain and a rare example of a two storey, moated Norman house built in the first half of the 12th Century. Mary Carter has thoroughly researched the history of the Manor from the first written record of it in 1041 to the present day. It is a fascinating and colourful story.

We discover that Lucy Boston bought the house and the three and a half acres that remained of the manorial estate in 1939. She had the house restored, and in the process took away as many of the of the later changes as possible thereby bringing the house back, as near as was realistic, to its Norman original. She then recreated it as the house of Green Knowe in her series of six Green Knowe books. Her daughter-in-law Diana Boston lives there now and leads visitors round the house on guided tours.

This is a fascinating and beautifully illustrated book by Diana Boston and Mary Carter, and is especially welcomed by Mary's many friends at The Free Church who remember her with pride and great affection. **SMD**

### Introducing Peter Welham.....

Hello everyone,

My name is Peter Welham and I am your new caretaker and hope to carry on the good work of Alan your previous caretaker.

Firstly I would like to thank all those that have been volunteering to keep the church running since Alan left in September. Various people have been involved in fire alarm & water checks, setting up chairs and tables for different functions within the church and have agreed to



carry on until the end of the month so that I can settle in and find my feet...

My background is engineering: when I left school a few years back now I was a motor mechanic then a maintenance engineer. I left that and went into the film industry for a couple of years doing sound effects for some major & minor films, notably I made some sound effects for Star Wars and watched that being made at EMI studios Borehamwood, where I met a few minor stars like Marty Feldman, Charlie Drake, Una Stubbs, and Richard Burton. Some of you younger people may need to google these names!

I then went into telecommunications and started work for BT as an engineer and stayed in the telecom arena for the next 30+ years. Now I think I have found my perfect role as caretaker at The Free Church in St Ives. Everyone that I have met so far has given me an enthusiastic welcome and has gone out of their way to make me feel welcome. I hope to work for the church for many years to come.

If anyone has anything that needs attending to, there is a book in the office (hanging on the notice board) that anyone can write in, so if there's a light bulb out, or a table or chair that needs repairing, just put it in the book giving as much detail as needed.

Outside work, I play golf with a great bunch of pensioners at Ramsey GC, on a Wednesday. I've been a member at Ramsey for 25 years with a handicap of 15. I have been as low as 11 but I'm not as young as I used to be and can't hit it as far these days. I've also worked on the golf committee on and off for over 9 years.

I play the guitar badly, mainly open string chords, for over 30 years. I've recently bought a Ukulele and I am teaching myself to play that, I've attempted to play the saxophone, clarinet, bass guitar, so I guess I am a tad musical. I do enjoy my music having a vinyl collection of over 500 LPs, and a collection of well over 200 CDs. My music taste is rock music I guess, but I have in my collections anything from classical to country & western, from Frank Sinatra to Van Morrison, from Bob Dylan to Jimi Hendrix and everything in between.

I am honestly going to give this role 110%, so please if you want anything doing or just want to have a chat feel free, you'll see me wandering round doing odd jobs, maintenance and so on and I look forward to working with you all.
