TOOKEY'S COFFEE SHOP

All being well, government restrictions will be lifted on June 21st and Tookey's will be able to re-open in the coffee shop itself instead of in the hall. The hall will only be used on Mondays as usual.

For a variety of reasons some volunteers feel unable to resume their usual duties and Pat Clarke has the difficult task of covering all shifts on her rota.

Tookey's brings in a good income for the Free Church and is greatly appreciated by our customers. It would be sad if we couldn't open 6 days a week as before.

The opening hours are: Monday 9:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

Tuesday – Saturday, 9:30 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

There are two shifts per day. These are: Monday 9:30 – 11:30 a.m.

“ 11:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

Tuesday – Saturday, 9:30 a.m. – 12 noon

“ “ 12 noon – 2:00 p.m.

Allowing time to set up, volunteers go in 15 minutes before opening and stay 15 minutes after closing to clear away.

So, here is a plea for more volunteers. Tuesdays and Saturdays will be particularly difficult to cover. We work in two's so no-one is expected to cope on their own. If you are not confident using the till you can choose just to wash up.

A free light lunch is available if required and free drinks throughout the shift.

Some volunteers work on a weekly basis and others just once a month. There is flexibility.

Please give this request some serious thought. Volunteering in Tookey's is an enjoyable experience and our customers are lovely.

THOUGHTS OF GERRY MEARS

Gerry and I had known each other for years - we met whilst working together in Tookey's. He was a difficult, but friendly man and the sort of man who you wanted "on your side". He would be very protective of those he felt were his friends.

During the last month or so, Gerry rang me every day, sometimes up to 5 times a day, explaining his troubles and concern about yet another chest infection. Since his sister, Caroline, had moved away, he said he had become, what he called, the "bread winner" of the family. It appears she had previously taken care of "things". He said he couldn't cope with being the "bread winner" and had no idea of what he was supposed to do or when. I could only answer his questions with the limited knowledge I had, but he was obviously troubled. I could tell from his telephone calls he was still suffering from a chest infection and after about 2 weeks or so I said "*Gerry, I think you ought to go to the hospital because the medication administered isn't working*". He didn't understand how important it was for him to get himself seen. I think he was worried about the "things" he had to take care of at home. I did say to him that there are always people around to help if he asked. Gerry said he would only speak to those HE felt would be of help to him. Obviously, he was frustrated at not getting through to the medical people he felt should have been there to help him and his family.

As I mentioned earlier, he rang me every day so when he didn't ring, I guessed something was wrong. I rang his mobile phone several times and received no answer. Little did I realise he had already passed away.

Whilst I was at home that evening, I received a telephone call to say Gerry had died in hospital following a heart attack as well as cancer. He told me some time ago that he had prostate cancer and was visiting hospital regularly for check-ups.

I was incredibly sad indeed to hear of his death especially since he was only 60 years of age.

Gerry had been a kick boxing champion, ran marathons, didn't smoke, drank very little and a committed Christian. He was worried about his family of course - his brother, Robert and sisters Caroline and Lisa. Did this extra burden of being the "bread winner" bring on the heart attack? Who knows!

As Pat Clarke would agree, he was a great asset to Tookey's since he did everything Pat asked of him. He was an extremely hard worker and loved the camaraderie and being part of the Tookey's team.

It was a great shock to hear of Gerry's passing and I hope those of us who knew Gerry will remember him with great affection.

I am unaware at this stage when his funeral is to be held, other than it will be held in Willingham Church. I hope as many of those who knew him will pray for him and his family.

God bless you Gerry - you are now at peace.

Or penalty scheme.


Essential trips only

SUPPORT YOUR IMPOVERISHED ARTISTS.

Philip's recollections of the pictures that were auctioned.

I refer to a question in my recent £1000 Quiz Challenge about articles donated by your members in two auction sales to raise funds for the re-construction of the church 40 years ago. The lots that raised the most money were three paintings by, then unknown, impoverished, local artists.

The first auction featured a watercolour donated by Freda Norris (as in Norris Museum) Eaton. It raised the staggering sum – in those days – of £600. Freda’s father, Herbert Norris, had several business interests – among them a grocery store on Crown Street.

Meanwhile, living in poverty at the Ferry Boat Inn, Holywell, was Garden William Fraser, a member of a large family of artists who lived in the region and specialised in scenes of the Fens. He would settle his grocery bills with paintings. Hence the generous donation by Freda Eaton.

Then there was the second auction to raise funds. At the same time that your church was being reconstructed four decades ago, so also was Houghton URC chapel into the fine retreat that became (now owned by the Parish Church in the village). . The project was supervised by your incumbent minister of the day. In the process of visiting the site, workmen gave him two apparent oil paintings that they found in the chapel’s gallery. They were encrusted with many decades of dust, grime and cobwebs. Perhaps they could become lots in the second auction sale, he thought? So he took them to the Manse and, apparently, gave his sons a bucket, brushes and a plastic bottle of Fairy Liquid, to remove the many decades of dust, grime and cobwebs – with the aid of the garden hosepipe! This they did --- revealing pictures of prehistoric animals. They were signed “Charles Whymper.”

Now Charles Whymper (1853-1941) was destined to become a noted artist and illustrator of renown. Earlier, living in Houghton, in poverty, within sight of the chapel, one can only guess at the reaction of Potto Brown and the congregation, when he presented them with two paintings of pre-historic monsters. So they were consigned to rot in the gallery.

I recall that they fetched bids totalling £2000 at your church’s second fund-raising auction sale. Again, a staggering sum in those days.

So the message is : support your local, impoverished artists. You never know ... one day perhaps.....
